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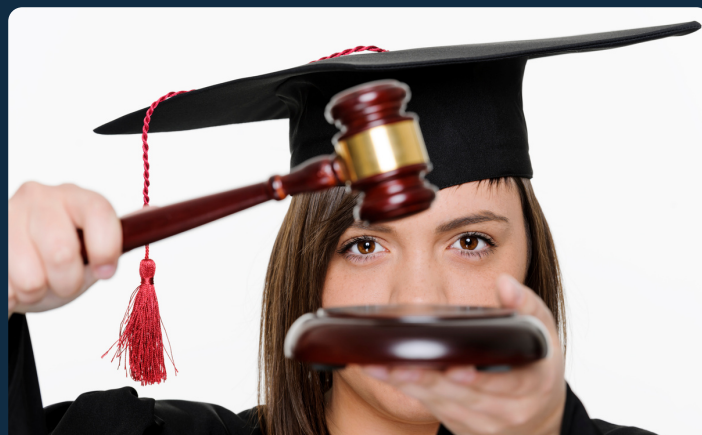
Section 1: What is LSAT? Who Conducts It?

Section 2: What is the Format of This Exam?

1. **Sections of the LSAT:** The LSAT consists of four 35-minute sections of multiple-choice questions and an unscored writing section. The multiple-choice sections measure the ability to think critically, analyze and evaluate the reasoning and arguments of others, and read complex texts with understanding and insight. Three of the multiple-choice sections are scored, while one section is unscored and used to evaluate new test questions and ensure they are free from any form of bias. These include:
2. The LSAT is composed of four 35-minute test sections. There is a **10-minute intermission** between the second and third sections. The test takes approximately 3 hours for standard test takers.
3. **Scoring:** The LSAT is scored on a scale of 120 to 180. The raw score is converted into a scaled score that law schools use to compare candidates.
4. **Test Dates and Locations:** The LSAT is offered multiple times a year at various locations worldwide. It is crucial to check the LSAC website for the most up-to-date information on test dates and registration deadlines.
5. Both the online, live remote-proctored and in-person modalities of the LSAT are administered through LawHub™. To familiarize yourself with the content and interface of the LSAT, we recommend using the free Official LSAT Prep materials available through LawHub. Using these practice tests, you'll be able to do everything you can do during the actual exam — eliminating and selecting responses, highlighting passages, setting screen preferences, and more.
